END TO EDUCATIONAL PHASE OF NEW TETHERING LAW CARL MACAULEY

On Dec 1st 2014 New Brunswick became the first province in Canada to implement time specific tethering laws. The ban on the tethering of dogs in NB is now between 23:00 hrs and 06:00 hrs daily.

A public education phase for the first few months of implementing tethering laws appears to have had an impact, with a much better than expected compliance by provincial dog owners. Though many complaints were called in over the last 7 months, after initial educational visits to residences by NB Animal Protection Officers, secondary calls to the same residences were minimal.

Now that the educational phase is past all NB dog owners are fully expected to comply with this new tethering law. Recent events displayed the NB courts' willingness to support this new law, with an NB resident being found guilty this past month and receiving a \$168.00 fine.

With sadness, the NBSPCA marks the passing of former President and Chief Animal Protection Officer James A. Little at his home in Miramichi in July, 2015.

A native of Saint John, Jim and his wife Nancy operated Securall Ltd. In Fredericton until his retirement in 1997. He became and SPCA Inspector 1982, Provincial Chief Inspector in 1992, and served as President of the Society from 1997 to 2000. Jim's Leadership of the NBSPCA brought rapid growth and many achievements: the democratization of the Society, the founding of new branches, the recruitment and professional training of the newly-created class of Animal Protection Officers, and finally the proclamation of the revised New Brunswick SPCA Act in March, 2000.

We remember Jim as one of the major builders of the humane movement in New Brunswick. He will be missed by everyone who supports that movement.
